

What is Britannica Online?

Britannica Online provides access to the contents of The Encyclopaedia Britannica, as well as links to useful web sites and related images, audio and video clips.

Britannica Online also includes an online Dictionary, Thesaurus, and Atlas of the World.

1. How can I access it?

- In Internet Explorer, type in the address below:

- If you are accessing this resource from outside the College, click on 'ATHENS Users log in here'. Enter the username and password (you can find these out from the library desk).

2. Searching

- Type the words you want to search for in the search text box:



3. Viewing and using your search results

- Your search results will be listed in three columns – links to web sites and magazine articles are on the left, Britannica articles are in the middle, and pictures/video clips are on the right:

- Related links will appear at the beginning of the article as appropriate. In the example below, these include maps and flags, media clips, and data tables:

- Clicking on [Print Article](#) will take you a printer-friendly version of that article.
- Clicking on [E-Mail Article](#) will give you the option to email somebody a copy of the article.
- Clicking on [Cite Article](#) will take you to suggestions as to how you might acknowledge your source if you quote from the article in your coursework.

Browsing

- You can also browse through the contents of Britannica online in a number of different ways:

- **The Index:**

lets you browse through the alphabetical index

- **A-Z Article Browse:**

lets you browse through the alphabetical contents list

- **Subject Browse:**

lets you browse for articles within a certain subject area

- **World Atlas:**

lets you browse through maps of the world

- **Timelines:**

lets you look at an interactive timeline of world events

- **Year In Review Browse:**

lets you look at the events of recent years

- **World Data**

lets you browse through information about countries

- **Notable Quotations**

lets you browse through a dictionary of quotations

- **Gateway to the Classics**

provides access to e-books containing the full text of various works of fiction, drama and non-fiction
